The MD Anderson Cancer Center and MD Anderson Physicians Network Symposium: Translating Molecular Biology into Individualized Cancer Care will address the rapidly evolving definition of disease subsets based on molecular testing, potential therapeutic targets of cancer cells, challenges of combining local, regional, and systemic therapeutic agents into the most effective multidisciplinary treatment strategies for each tumor type and subtype, and the understanding of the immune system as it relates to the survival of the cancer cell as well as the increasingly effective immunological interventions that are making the most resistant types of cancer sensitive to immunotherapy. Additionally, this symposium will highlight the importance of fertility issues, integrative oncology, palliative care, and end-of-life issues for cancer patients. These professional practice gaps will be addressed through highly focused lectures and translated to clinical practice with case-based discussions.

The interactive sessions during the symposium will allow participants to obtain educational feedback to better improve patient outcomes in the community setting. Attendees will have an opportunity to discuss difficult and complicated cases with faculty at the "Meet the Professor" session. Keynote and didactic sessions will allow participants to expand their knowledge, increase their competence and improve management performance.

Educational Objectives

After attending the symposium, participants should be able to

- Apply the evolving science to clinical care by utilizing the molecular tools and biomarkers to identify molecular subtypes of the major cancers (Knowledge, Competence, Performance);
- Molecularly characterize cancer cells by identifying signaling pathways that
 influence cell growth and survival and the mechanisms of cell death that relate
 to newly developed oncology therapeutics (Knowledge, Competence);
- Analyze available local, regional, and systemic therapeutic agents to choose the most effective combination of treatments for each specific tumor to improve patient outcomes (Knowledge, Competence, Performance, Patient Outcomes);
- Evaluate immunological treatment plans based on the basics of cancer immunology and how it relates to the survival of the cancer cell (Knowledge, Competence);
- Develop individualized treatment plans for cancer patients that make full use of integrative oncology for management of pain, symptoms, and other aspects of whole patient care (Knowledge, Competence, Performance, Patient Outcomes).

Target Audience

This symposium will be beneficial to medical oncologists, radiation oncologists, surgical oncologists, general surgeons, internists, physician assistants, oncology nurses, and advanced practice nurses involved in the care of patients with breast, gastrointestinal, and lung cancers; and in immunology, immunotherapy, integrative medicine, ethics, and palliative care.

The MD Anderson Cancer Center and MD Anderson Physicians Network Symposium: Translating Molecular Biology into Individualized Cancer Care will address the rapidly evolving definition of disease subsets based on molecular testing, potential therapeutic targets of cancer cells, challenges of combining local, regional, and systemic therapeutic agents into the most effective multidisciplinary treatment strategies for each tumor type and subtype, and the understanding of the immune system as it relates to the survival of the cancer cell as well as the increasingly effective immunological interventions that are making the most resistant types of cancer sensitive to immunotherapy. Additionally, this symposium will highlight the importance of fertility issues, integrative oncology, palliative care, and end-of-life issues for cancer patients. These professional practice gaps will be addressed through highly focused lectures and translated to clinical practice with case-based discussions.

The interactive sessions during the symposium will allow participants to obtain educational feedback to better improve patient outcomes in the community setting. Attendees will have an opportunity to discuss difficult and complicated cases with faculty at the "Meet the Professor" session. Keynote and didactic sessions will allow participants to expand their knowledge, increase their competence and improve management performance.

Educational Objectives

After attending the symposium, participants should be able to

- Apply the evolving science to clinical care by utilizing the molecular tools and biomarkers to identify molecular subtypes of the major cancers (Knowledge, Competence, Performance);
- Molecularly characterize cancer cells by identifying signaling pathways that influence cell growth and survival and the mechanisms of cell death that relate to newly developed oncology therapeutics (Knowledge, Competence);
- Analyze available local, regional, and systemic therapeutic agents to choose the most effective combination of treatments for each specific tumor to improve patient outcomes (Knowledge, Competence, Performance, Patient Outcomes);
- Evaluate immunological treatment plans based on the basics of cancer immunology and how it relates to the survival of the cancer cell (Knowledge, Competence);
- Develop individualized treatment plans for cancer patients that make full use of integrative oncology for management of pain, symptoms, and other aspects of whole patient care (Knowledge, Competence, Performance, Patient Outcomes).

This symposium will be beneficial to medical oncologists, radiation oncologists, surgical oncologists, general surgeons, internists, physician assistants, oncology nurses, and advanced practice nurses involved in the care of patients with breast, gastrointestinal, and lung cancers; and in immunology, immunotherapy, integrative medicine, ethics, and palliative care.


